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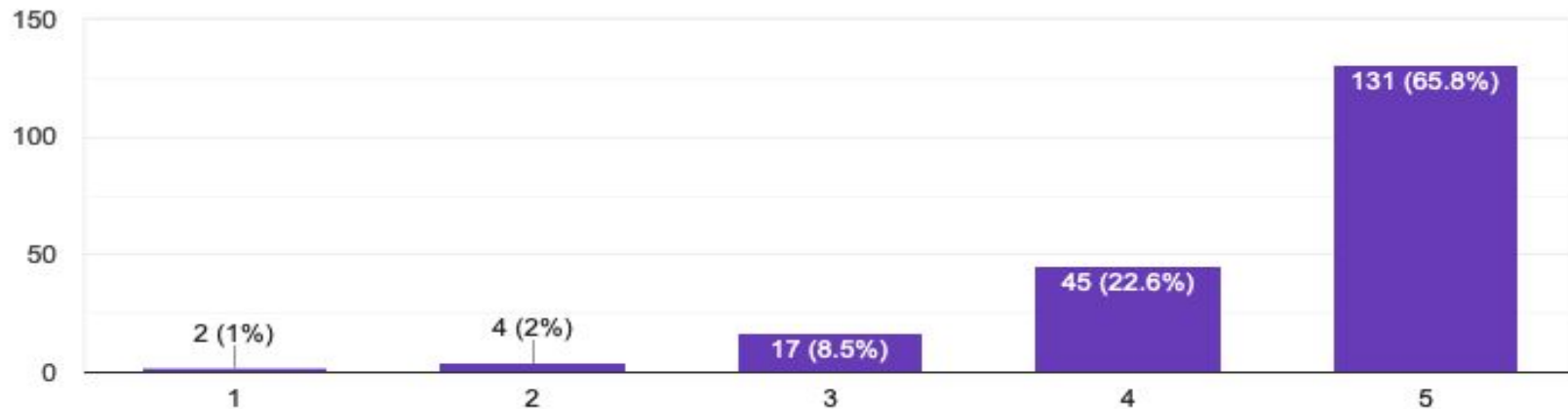
Kindergarten parent survey results

- 218 responses (15 from WRAP families)
 - Feedback on amount of adult support needed
 - Interest in all-in with 6 feet
 - Interest in all-in with fewer than 6 feet
 - Interest in WRAP
 - Preferred option
 - WRAP families feedback
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On the days when your child is at home learning remotely, how much adult support needs to be provided in order for your child to successfully complete the day's activities (you can skip this question if you are not sure)?

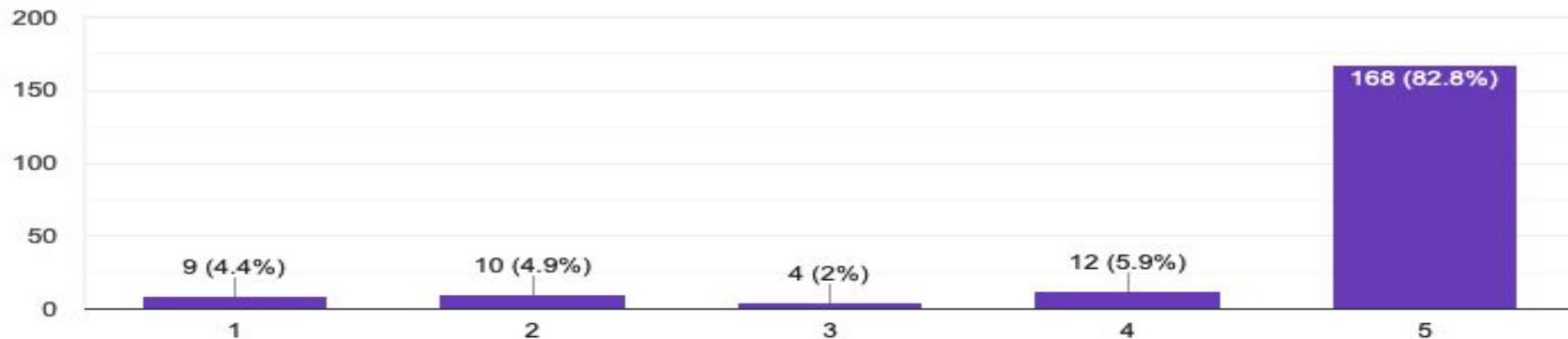

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The Governor is recommending that schools attempt to bring students into school on a more regular basis. Because of space configurations and constraints, however, it is very likely that Wayland would not be able to maintain six feet of social distancing in all Kindergarten classrooms if all Kindergarteners were to attend. But if the District were able to maintain six feet of social distancing between student desks in your child's classroom, how interested would you be in having your Kindergarten child attend school four days a week?

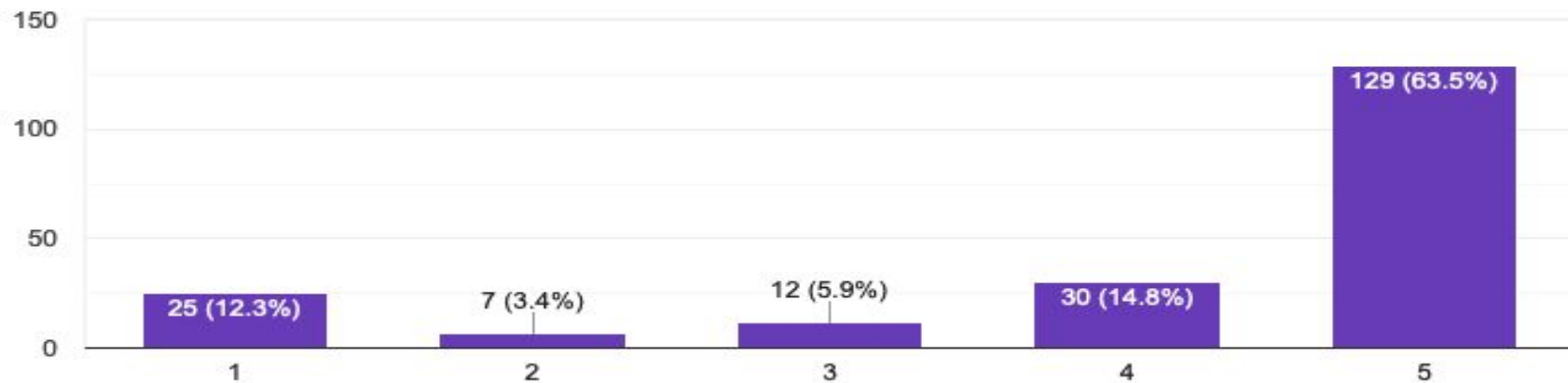

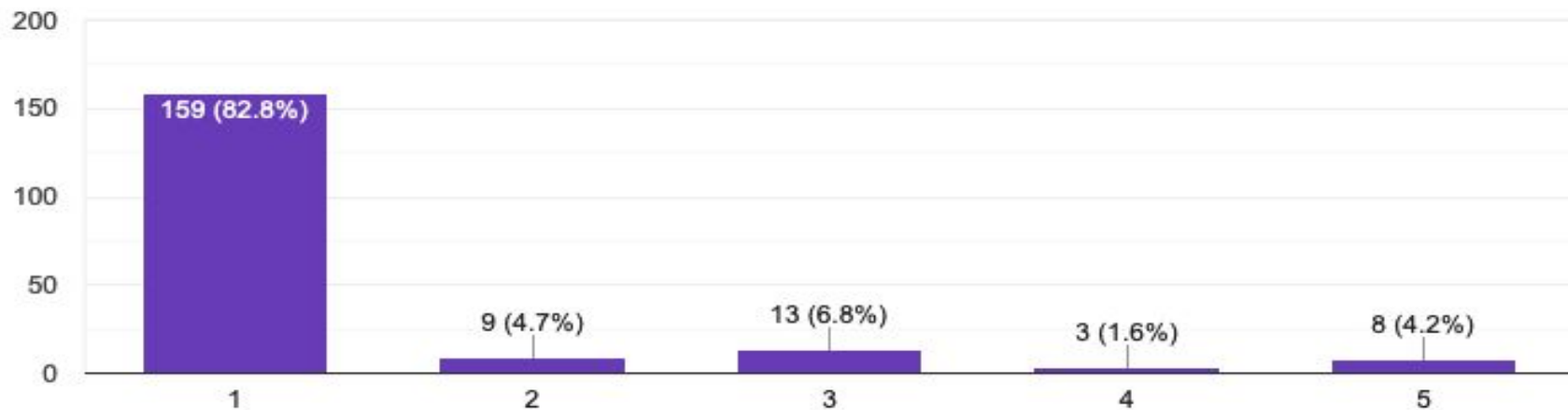

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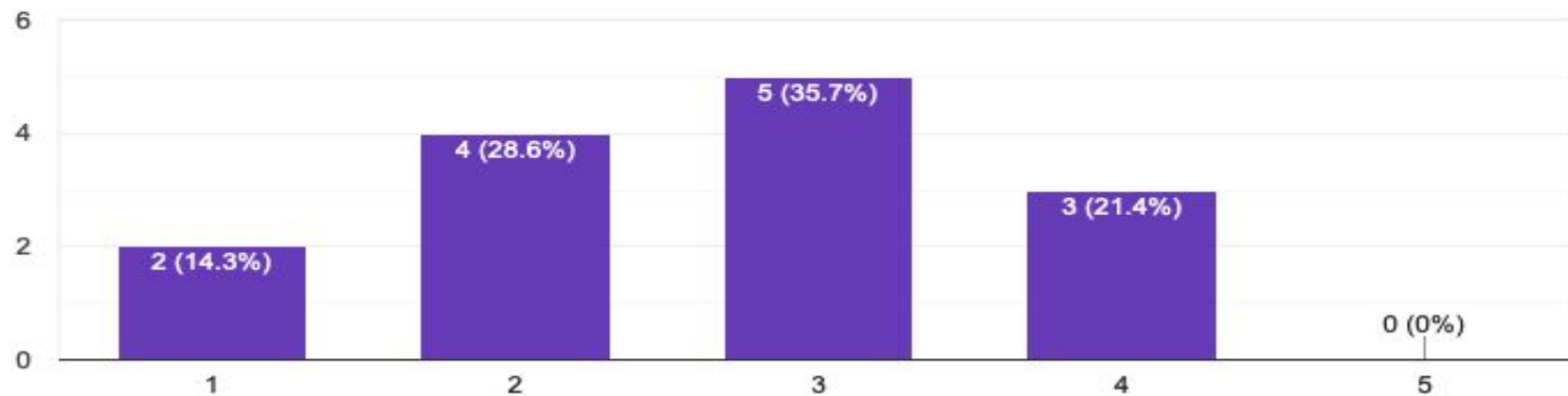

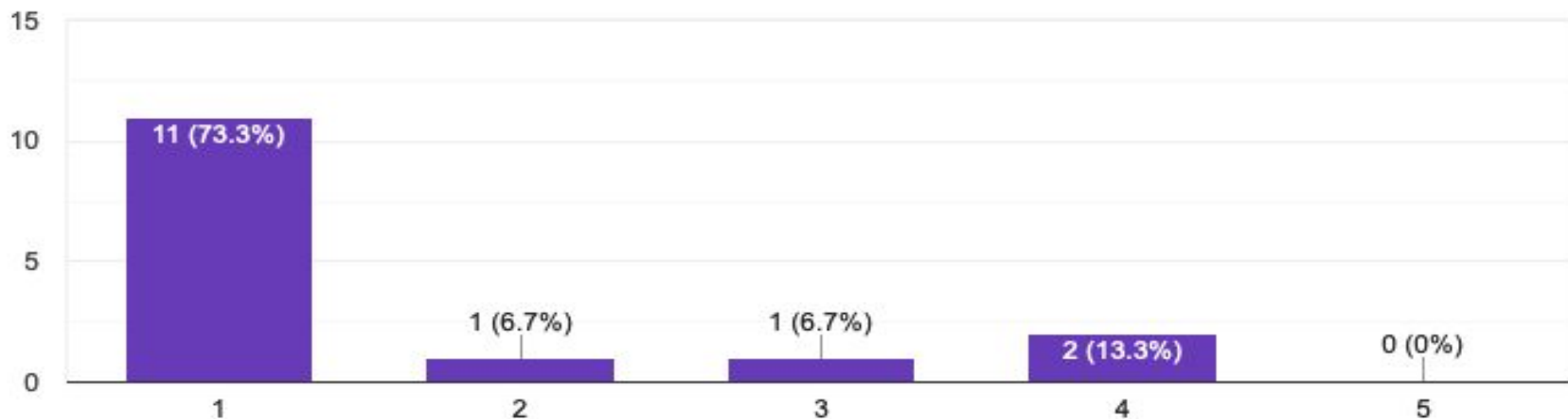

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Kindergarten teacher survey results

- 9 responses
 - Qualitative survey questions
 - Advantages
 - Concerns
 - Comfort level with less than 6 feet
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Kindergarten teacher feedback

- Clear recognition of advantages (social-emotional, academic growth, less screen time, easier to plan)
 - Lots of concerns
 - Ability to maintain social distancing
 - Health and safety
 - Managing the space and stuff
 - Managing the routines
 - Stress and exhaustion
 - Spread of adult attention
 - Very uncomfortable with less than 6 feet of distance
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Room capacity information

- There are some classrooms where we could currently make 6 feet work, but it would be very tight
 - The majority of classrooms would be between 5 and 6 feet of distance between desks
 - Kindergarten classrooms are generally the largest classrooms -- larger alternative spaces would typically be non-classroom spaces (e.g., libraries)

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Financial ramifications of keeping 6 feet

- Adding between two and four additional classrooms (one of those for WRAP)
 - Roughly \$40,000 per teacher and \$16,000 per TA = between \$112,000 and \$224,000 for staffing
 - Classroom supplies and materials = approx. \$10-15,000
 - Furniture and facilities
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Additional considerations

- Scheduling changes
 - Lunch
 - Recess
 - Arrival and dismissal
 - Busing
 - Setting up new rooms and/or switching rooms
 - Almost definitely rules out the possibility of any other grade returning all-in (if maintaining 6 feet)
 - Adding classrooms means shifting students to new teachers
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
