Hello Happy Hollow Friends!

There are so many wonderful things that coincide with the spring. The days are longer, brighter and warmer. Students begin to spend more time outside ~and the outside calls to all of us. It is also second to the Holiday Season for finding people with much to do.

Spring sports abound ~ many with late night “under the lights” game times. Fenway opens its doors and may offer night events to some. It seems as though there are more family events to attend ~ weddings, Bar and Bat Mitzvahs, Confirmations, First Communions, Passover, Easter and vacations for many.

At school we have our own special version of the whirlwind mix. We begin with another round of MCAS. Gently add in the 5th grade play. Sprinkle with strings and band concerts coming up. Add a generous scoop of open houses, a whole biography show, first grade memory shows, field trips, a recorder concert, lots of school meetings, field day, the Happy Hollow picnic... and so much more. You can add to the list to taste but the end result is much the same. The last ten weeks of school tend to be a perfect whirlwind! On top of that, the building heats up ~ sometimes it feels like 350 to 425 degrees and remains preheated ~ And if it does so early, it can make it more challenging for some to concentrate. The mix is complete when we stir in the end of the year with move-along day and farewell times ~ Shake well and you have instant whirlwind!



Why do I mention all of this? For elementary students there is another layer to the farewell times. They have worked hard to build a class culture and community. They have bonded with their teachers and have seen more of their teacher and classmates than anyone else in their young lives. They have created a social family at school ~ a school family.

Because of this ~ whether it has been the best year or not ~ they have siblings and we all know that siblings can “push those buttons” with precision that can sting. My message is this ~ It is truly a time for **patience and pardons**. Please talk with your child about the stresses and help them to see the positives. When possible, try to keep to a normal bedtime.



Sleep is so important as the underpinnings to help students navigate this tricky time of year.

In this way, we can keep the seats in my office for service learning meetings and not discipline meetings. Like people of all ages, elementary age children do better when they can talk about what is going on for them. ~ We will be sending them the message to be easy with themselves and others. We will spend time helping them work through the arguments and changes in friendships ~ the heat and final projects. Join us in that conversation and things are always left to a more positive end. It is as exciting as it is daunting and with the “exciting lens” firmly in place, good things continue to happen. Kindness always matters...

The final part of my message is the third /p/ that arrives with the spring. It is the “placement” /p/. We need the patience and pardons for the placement process! May brings us the overwhelming task of creating new class configurations ~ and we always do it better with your input.

There are guidelines for how I can accept your input and they are ones I adhere to strictly. The reason is that I must be fair to all 437 students and their families who comprise our school. Things to remember:

1.) I want to begin by dispelling the misconception that I personally choose a particular teacher for a particular child... It is simply not possible. I cannot pick a teacher for 437 individual students with individual needs. Our process is to create balanced classes and that is done by the grade level teams. The teacher names are assigned after that and I do assign teacher names to classes. Once a class is balanced, it is nearly impossible to move even one student without affecting five or six other students. “Why?”



you ask. Well, say a group of children are put in a room for reading support ~ say another group is put together for friendship reasons ~ say another group is put together to challenge each other ~ another to receive special education services ~ still another to avoid combinations that are known not to be positive ~ another so there are leaders and independent thinkers ~ one more for good luck... and you see how moving even one student becomes a house of cards falling or a domino effect... Therefore, I need and welcome all input. I will do my best with my team of teachers, special educators, guidance counselors, reading specialists, the METCO coordinator and a little bit of magic to put the whole puzzle in place. It is no easy feat. So, if all of your requests are not met, we will do our best to meet at least one. Also, please remember, we cannot and will not accept specific teacher requests.

2.) **I am accepting letters up to Wednesday, April 25, 2012** ~ those that will assist us in the placement of your child/children. We begin grouping on May 2nd and need the week before to organize and prepare for the rest of the process. It is crucial for us to have this information and I want to hear from you if you have any questions or concerns.



3.) These are our steps that lead us to balanced classes~

Step One: Every year is important in your child’s life and we take placement very seriously. New teacher assignments will be made by move-along day so that your child/children and you will be able to relax and prepare for the upcoming year without all of the anxiety that waiting to find out may bring. For us that means May is our deadline for beginning our work. It is a huge task and one we approach thoughtfully and thoroughly.

Step Two: This step involves collegial collaboration among staff. Classroom teachers will meet with specialists, guidance counselors and special education teachers to create well-balanced heterogeneous groupings which reflect diverse talents, interests and needs. The staff will also address factors such as gender, social and academic strengths, special needs and friendships - not necessarily “best friends” but students who have nice working relationships in school. (We try to make sure that every child has a mix of one or more of their classmates from this year’s class in his/her class next year so that he/she will have some familiar faces around him/her.) The classroom groups will then be submitted to the principal for comments and/or adjustment.

Step Three: The final step is when the lists arrive at my office. At that point, I will sit down with the guidance department for a final look. After that, I will assign a teacher to each group.

4.) So what feedback are we looking for from you?

Although you may not request a certain teacher, you may give us very valuable information that we consider very seriously in our goal to place your child so that he/she is set for another great year. Therefore, you may write requests about placement if the following circumstances exist:

- Concerns about an older sibling’s experience with a specific teacher.

Please keep in mind that teachers may be moving grade levels. Teachers may also make a request based upon personal experience with a family.

- Request that your child not be placed with a specific child due to personal experience and impact on your child’s learning.
- You may want to describe how your child learns best ~ but know that all of our teachers work to meet the needs of all of the children in their classes so this does not guarantee a certain teacher over another, it merely helps us to create groups of children where your child might feel most comfortable; or maybe the location of one room would be better than another for your child, based upon a need.

Please honor the deadline, as the work we do around placement is extremely complex and one change can disrupt a group, causing teachers to begin from scratch; or it may be that you get the letter to us too late for us to consider the important information that you have given to us. ~ Please enjoy the spring, the next segment of the school year and build the kind of memories that make a year outstanding in your mind! Please contact me with any questions or concerns ~ my door is always open and I am always available by phone or email.

No matter what you do, have a safe, happy and healthy April vacation! Take care and a very happy spring to you and your wonderful families!


Music Classes with Mrs. Calkins, April 2012

Grade 1- During the short month of April first graders will sing, dance, and perform percussion instruments on a variety of songs and musical games. Developing skills in beat competency, singing in tune, and music literacy will provide a foundation for performance activities. Students will accompany themselves on percussion instruments as they sing new songs. They will also experiment with expressive storytelling using music and movement.

Grade 2- Second Graders will conclude their study of the symphony orchestra, as they learn to identify instrument families and sonorities. They will play percussion instruments and be provided an opportunity to perform for their class as vocal soloists on the "Sounds of Nature" song. Finally, they will begin a unit based on the "Erie Canal" song comprised of singing, percussion performance along with a study of the history, geography and mechanics of the Erie Canal.

Bytes from Technology



1st Grade: Students finished their penguin graphic organizers and they were sent home. They did a wonderful job! Last week we began a robotics unit by reintroducing the children to Beebots, a programmable robot. Students work at stations with a Beebot and a mat. The mats reinforce the concepts of money, shape attributes, phonics...The children program the Beebot to move on the mat to complete a variety of challenges. When programming, the children need to think about their path and then use a sequence of commands to complete their task. Ask your child if they can remember the commands (forward, backwards, right turn and left turn).

2nd Grade: Second graders are still working on their animated butterfly scene using the program MicroWorlds Jr. Students are working on a few of the more advanced programming skills - flipping a costume (so the butterfly can move in several different directions), and turning the butterfly (so the butterfly can be taught to fly right then left, then right then left...). Projects will be completed before the April break.

3rd Grade: Third graders have begun their rock slideshow unit. Students have completed the research, which we began at school and then students completed as homework. Thank you for your support. This week students planned out their slideshow by creating a storyboard. Students used the storyboard to: organize their facts, design layouts and to think about file naming. The storyboard should keep them focused during our class.

4th Grade: - Students in grade 4 have just completed creating a poetry podcast in technology class. Each class prepared the children through studying poetry in the classroom. Then each student chose a favorite poem to record and produce in a Podcast. These recordings were added to a Garageband Podcast file. Once the images were added and synched to their voices the podcasts were saved and uploaded to their Wayland Google account. Ask your child to see their work. They can share it with you through their Google account.

Grade 5: students have been writing digital stories in Technology class and their classrooms. With their language arts teacher they wrote a script and then they recorded the story in technology class. They also drew illustrations for their story in Kid Pix. The recordings and illustrations were put into iMovie and saved. Their movies were uploaded to their Wayland Google account. Ask you child to share it with you through their Wayland Google account.

Hooray to our Assembly Tech Crew:

The Assembly Tech Crew is a shared fifth grade responsibility. Interested students signed up at the beginning of the school year. These students participate when their class is hosting School Assembly. In addition to being emcees and users, students rotate between the following tech responsibilities: digital camera (2 photographers) and document camera/laptop station. We also have two students who run our sound system. After assemblies, the Tech Crew has a working lunch in the computer lab. Students create short Animoto videos using the digital photos taken during assembly. Videos are posted on the Assembly website. Check out all of their hard-work! I'm impressed with their commitment to this volunteer program.
