Dear Friends,

The longer I work and serve in the field of education, the more I realize just how important it is to pay attention to the details ~ most especially when helping our young people understand and navigate our often complex and confusing world.

A first grader came up to me last Friday ~ after report cards went home on Thursday, February 2nd and said, “I got my report card, Mr. Lee!” He seemed happy enough and was rushing toward his bus.

“How wonderful!” I called after him. “I know it’s your first one, so you must be so excited!”

He stopped and squinted as he looked up at me and into the sun. His smile left his face. “I am,” he hesitated. “I only got two /D’s/ so... I guess that means I did good... Except I always thought /D’s/ were really bad but my mom said it was okay. So I told my big brother to please not say /D’s/ are bad. Do you think it was bad that I got /D’s/?”

“No! Not at all! They mean you are “Developing” ~ and that means growing and showing that you are trying your hardest. We don’t have report cards that are like /A/, /B/, /C/, /D/ and /F/. Those are for much older children.

“That’s what my mom said! Thank you!”

He ran off...

/D/, /P/, /ME/, /EE/ and maybe /N/. ~ Nothing confusing about that! Furthermore, explaining “Developing”, “Progressing”, “Proficient”, “Meeting expectations”, “Exceeding Expectations” and “Not Assessed at this time” really clears things up ~ especially for a young learner ~ Don’t you think so?

The fact is that no matter how we place them in the paradigm of explanation ~ once we begin to explain the words, a natural hierarchy forms. Everyone wants “Exceeding Expectations” ~ and why would anyone feel differently? ~ “Exceeding Expectations” becomes an /A/, “Meeting Expectations” becomes a /B/, “Progressing” becomes a /C/ and “Developing becomes a /D/ ~ with room for /N/ “not addressed” to stand alone on its own meaning. ~ Anyone who has ever been to school easily slips into this pattern of thinking ~ because that is how it has been for most of the years of public education. It remains that way once a student leaves elementary school. So why should anyone believe any differently? ~ Most especially our students? Therein lies my reason for writing this piece. To get started, we must realize as Diane Sawyer has “...that there is no substitute for paying attention.”

Howard Gardner, a professor at Harvard University and the founder of Project Zero ~ embracing multiple intelligences in all human beings ~ explains elementary school assessment well when he stated, “A good assessment instrument can be a learning experience. It is extremely desirable to have the assessment occur in the context of students working on problems, projects, or products that generally engage them, that hold their interest and motivate them to do well.” ~ which aptly describes elementary school settings ~ especially ours.

Next, I would ask you to consider using Dr. Gardner's lens as the context for looking at your child's report card. Each category is unto itself. Just as /N/ "Not Assessed at this time" stands without worry, without the analysis of an assumed rate of success ~ so too should each of the other categories stand. The elementary report card need not be viewed as a measurement tool, but rather, should be used to look at the big picture of how a student is doing. Elementary-aged students are all developing in one way or another ~ and they are assessed in many different ways each day they spend in school.

We are increasingly better able to collect and study pertinent data, plan explicit interventions and move all students toward increased levels of proficiency. We live in a time where there is a common core curriculum across the state; and we believe that learning and achieving should not have a predictable end. ~ It's a lifelong pursuit. There are plenty of measures both formal and informal along the way. Students will take state tests and school-based assessments ~ And, most importantly, we will tend to all of their individual needs.

However, for the five short years that we have your child or children at our school, we have time to help him/her or them, to develop, to make progress, to meet expectations and even to exceed them. All endeavors are developmental.

This is why it is crucial that we consistently encourage our learners; and that their report cards be used as the springboard for an honest discussion that leaves them feeling reassured, ready to take risks, accept new challenges and begin to understand how they are learning. You should discuss what each category means with language they can understand. Explain that we are on a journey ~ strengths and areas of challenge are a part of that process. You should assure your child/children that we are all partners en route ~ parents, teachers and even their peers..

A certain way to slow, create obstacles and even stops along the journey is to bring a young person to a place of doubt or uncertainly. They look to adults, scrutinize our expressions and words for affirmation and to comprehend that which they do not. And when they do not believe what we tell them; or when they feel something is missing from our explanations, they do as all humans at all ages do. They create their own interpretation. They believe what they think makes sense. ~ My first grade friend, described at the start of this article, was even asking for a second opinion! Children are smart and getting smarter with each day they live and interact with the world in which they reside.

Therefore, we must help them to form strong self-esteems and self-concepts. We must let them know that as long as there is a /C/ for "Consistently" under effort and personal growth descriptors, they are truly on the right path. Forming a young person is much more complex than a system of grade point averages and the language must be put in plain words that can be taken in by the listener/reader. Effective effort is the key to success at all levels of educating, but none so important as the years a person spends in elementary school. Marvel at their development and talk to them honestly about areas they are still working to develop. Explain how they are progressing and celebrate the ways they meet or exceed expectations. The more they understand, the more they will pay attention and the more proficient they will become.

Grade 1

During the short month of February first graders will sing, dance, and move to a variety of songs. We will focus on beat competency and music literacy, sing spirituals, and use game songs to practice skills. The traditional Afro-American spirituals "Train is a Comin'" and "Get on Board" will provide the framework for engaging movement activities and practice with mallet instruments. We'll also learn a Valentine song, just in time to share with loved ones on Valentine's Day.

Grade 2

Second Graders will continue to practice reading rhythmic notation, honing their skills with activities such as Rockin' Rhythm Raps and an interactive listening quiz. They will also compose and perform original rhythm patterns as they learn to distinguish the relationship between 'heartbeat pulse' and rhythm patterns and sequences. - Parents need to be checking their cell phones throughout the day as a message maybe left if your child is sick and needs to be picked up from school.



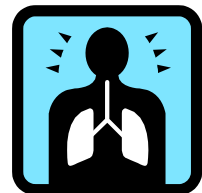
Head Lice Checks After Vacation:

- There will be an entire school, head lice check, following February school vacation. It will be conducted Tuesday, February 28th at 8:45am. Please contact Elizabeth Curtain (escurtain@comcast.net) the PTO head lice coordinator if you are available to help with this very important check.



Please observe your children for the following:

- There continue to be cases of strep throat throughout our community. Possible signs and symptoms of strep throat include: Headache, stomachache, sore throat, swollen neck glands, may or may not have a fever, cough- if you child has any symptoms please have them checked by their physician. Children need to stay home a minimum of 24 hours after receiving their antibiotic.



- There have also been a few cases of pneumonia and/or bronchitis.
- Norovirus (gastrointestinal virus) is on the rise in Massachusetts. There is sudden onset of vomiting, diarrhea, and abdominal pain-feeling very ill. Proper hand washing is the only way to slow it down. All surfaces must be washed down as well. There have not been any cases here at school.



- If your child has any of these symptoms, please keep them home for at least 72 hours to help prevent the spread of illness to others. Please call the safe to school line at 508-358-2160 if your student will be absent from school. If your child is sick please identify the reason so that we can monitor illness within our school.

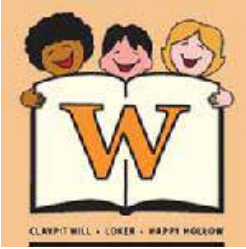
