PRINCIPAL'S CORNER

January, 2014

Dear Friends,

In the practice of education we constantly rediscover the world in a way that passes along the culture of our time to our young people. They in turn, touch this moment ~ today; and apply what they know to a time that we can only imagine ~ the future. Because of this, as much as the fundamentals of our system for educating remain the same, they grow and change to reflect the needs of a given period.



Therefore, it can be said that we measure and report out differently now than we did ten years ago... ~

It can also be said that we were grading differently ten years ago than when I was young. My peers and I were put on a Bell Curve and assigned a letter grade in each subject including conduct and effort ~ from first grade on up. In recent years, the language was different yet again ~ we looked to words that captured development, progress and exceeding expectations. We learned that development takes time and too, that people develop at different times and in different ways. Now we have the Common Core and standards that guide our process, so again we find ourselves in a period of change. In this system, the sky is the limit! No one is ever done growing “smarter”. There is no cap on one’s potential and the art of educating is to now find the “right” way to find the tools to help all to learn and to keep on learning.



I preface all of this in the above context because, it is important to recognize there were no “good ole days” in educating. ~ Every period has come with changes. Each time, we think we are falling on the greatest of the “new ways”! ~ When in fact, every decade has brought with it “new ways”. Heraclitus put it in these terms, “There is nothing permanent except change.”

In this spirit, I am pleased to announce that this January, we will be sending home our new standards-based report card. There are three main reasons for this: 1. The traditional grading categories on the most recent way of grading were too broad to give a clear and accurate picture of a student’s skill, progress and capability levels. 2. The new categories reflect what is happening right now in education across our country, state and district ~ and to that end, they align with district, state and national standards. 3. The standards-based report card will provide learners and parents with a very clear picture of a student’s progress at attaining all of the grade level standards. Instead of reporting that a student is progressing in reading, there will be many areas of reading that will be reported upon including fluency, comprehension, knowledge regarding genres ~ and all of this will be in the context of what we expect from a student at a given grade level.



This means that the new report card is reflective of the school year itself. ~ When a student enters a given grade, he/she is embarking on a year-long journey ~ and now the report card is based upon the full year’s journey. The expectation is that most students will not meet the standard until the end of the school year.

So, what will be the same and what will be different?

Remaining the same will be:

- *how we report on social development and work habits,
- *how we report on science and social studies work,
- *how the teacher reports narratively through comment boxes,
- *and the reporting periods for the year will remain the same (fall conferences, followed by a January report card, followed by a spring conference, ending with a final report card).

What will be different is:

- *each grade level will have its own progress report that aligns with the new Common Core State Standards in ELA and Mathematics.
- *Student progress will be measured and reported to reflect sub-categories under the broad topics of ELA and Mathematics, and will pinpoint student progress based on an “end-of-the-year” standard.
- *The report card will have new performance levels,
- *and it will also show changes in how we report on a student’s progress in art, music and health and wellness (physical education).

The biggest change is that you will now be able to have rich conversations with your child about his/her progress. If he/she is reading with accuracy and fluency but is finding it challenging to identify basic facts and key details in the fiction genre, you can talk about it, read together and help. This will be exciting.

If a child is used to receiving all “Exceeding Expectations”, he/she might receive “Progressing Independently” ~ meaning he/she is doing exactly as he/she should be with the grade level standard, and by the end of the year, he/she will be “Meeting the Standard” ~ or even showing “Exemplary Performance” at that time. The progress is based upon the year’s standard. ~ It should take the whole year to “Meet the Standard”. “Exemplary Performance” will mean a student consistently performs the *end-of-the year grade-level standard*. It also will mean that a student is self-motivated and independently grasps, applies, and extends key ideas. Everything is based on the year’s journey.

Grading categories will include:

EP ~ Exemplary Performance

MS ~ Meeting the Standard ~ The students consistently demonstrates proficiency in meeting the *end-of-the year* standard.

PI ~ Progressing Independently

PS ~ Progressing with Support

PB ~ Progressing Below Grade Level

All of these categories will be fully explained on the report card. I write to you now so you will be more informed and have time to understand the changes. Please keep in mind that students at a given grade *should be falling somewhere in the progressing range* at this time of the year because meeting the standard ~ for most, will happen at the end of the year.

As always, please contact me with any questions ~ now or when the report card goes out. In the meantime, you can view the report cards on our district curriculum page under Elementary Progress Report ~ just click on the appropriate grade. I hold that the new report card will give you an accurate picture of where your child is in a very specific way. The conversations can be precise and focused. I am very excited about this new tool! ~ We change, we grow, and we learn together, always looking to create a brighter future.

I wish you all a very Happy New Year! May 2014 bring you and your families all of life's best, always!





Music Notes

Grade 4

During the month of January, fourth graders will sing, play instruments and experiment with melodic improvisation. Each student will participate in a brief mid-year assessment of rhythmic and vocal competencies through participation in a rhythm game and a song. They will also study the life and music of the American composer, Charles Ives. Students will also create an original work of visual art reflecting their own unique response to a very unusual Ives composition.

Grade 1

During the month of January we will focus on musical storytelling. Students will participate in a variety of classroom activities and games designed to foster the development of enhanced listening, beat-keeping, rhythmic literacy and vocal and percussion performance skills. Students will also participate in a brief mid-year assessment of rhythmic and vocal competencies.



Students enjoyed the Hour of Code activities in December. I tell the students that programming is problem solving; similar to working with puzzles. Some of us can solve these problems quickly; some of us need to work on it. It was amazing to see the children help each other when they were stuck on a program. We will continue to use programming throughout the year. Links to the Hour of Code sites are still posted on the Computer Lab Links page under "For Students".



Kid Pix Deluxe 3D

1st Grade: Students continue to learn the tools in Kid Pix 3D. The newest tools we have explored are the backgrounds and stickers tool. A new feature of Kid Pix 3D is animating a sticker. Ask your child about this.

2nd Grade: Second graders are working on a programming-robotics unit. Robotics deals with the design, construction and operation of robots. We used the website [Turtle Pond](#), and the Hour of Code websites to review the four basic commands. Ask your child what are the 4 basic commands. This month students will carry over that knowledge and design an animated scene using the software MicroWorlds Jr.

3rd Grade - We begin January with a word processing unit. First we will introduce the students to All The Right Type, our online keyboarding program. To access ATRT online - please use the link under the ["For Students" section of the Happy Hollow website](#). Because student data is saved in the cloud, students can now work seamlessly on their keyboarding skills between home and school. At this point, I reinforce accuracy with the children. Speed will come with time.



4th Grade: Welcome back everyone. In January we will pick back up with our small moment digital story project. Students have been writing a small moment story in google docs. We have been working on adding descriptive details to their writing. This will move their writing beyond just a series of events. Students are using Kid Pix to illustrate pictures for their story. I would like the children to use a website called VoiceThread which would allow them to pull these pieces together into a digital story. This project pulls in a variety of expectations - narrative writing process, using technology tools for publishing, and use of voice. **If you haven't already given me permission, please use the [following link to learn more about VoiceThread and to grant permission](#) for your child to use this online resource. I will create the account for students. If you don't complete the permission form, then your child will not be able to use VoiceThread. Thank you for your attention to this matter.**



Grade 5:

5th Grade: Students in Ms. Mattson's and Ms. Candini's class will work on the Hour of Code websites, as I didn't see them for this rotation in December. Students will also finish up their Digital Superhero Comic Strip. Students designed their own digital superhero whose goal is to protect digital citizens. Students are using Kid Pix to illustrate and depict their superhero saving the day. Students will then export their Kid Pix pictures as jpegs. Lastly, students will bring their pictures into iMovie to create the comic strip. We will share our projects upon completion.
