1. What new ideas did you think about this year?
2. What was special about the year?
3. For all you are grateful ~ Who had a hand in your success? How do you know that?
4. Name five things you didn't know about before the year started.
5. What did you get better at this year? How did you get better at it?
6. What people did you meet ~ in school ~ on field trips ~ in cultural enrichment ~ etc.?





7. What projects did you do? Which ones came out the best and why?
8. When were you kind to someone and how did that turn out?
9. Did you participate in service learning in some way? What was that like? Will you do it again or for the first time?
10. When did you try something new?
11. Did you take any risks?
12. Name one happy time. What were you doing?
13. What was fun?
14. What was challenging? How did you make it through?
15. What is perseverance? Did you develop the ability to persevere?
16. What is stamina? How did you show stamina this year?
17. When were you a good friend and what did that feel like?
18. When was someone a good friend to you and what did you learn from that?
19. Are you still working on a challenge? How can I help you when the new year begins?
20. Who helped you and will you ever be able to help someone in that way?
21. When were you helpful?
22. How did you bring the core values of the school alive?
23. Why do you think people say that, “In the end, only kindness matters?” Do you agree? Why/why not?

Discuss with your child or children a time when they felt most successful, triumphant. Tell them to remember what that time was like and how they felt so they can keep that in mind and know that at least one way to learn is by building upon successes. Remind them that learning from mistakes and the times of challenge are equally important because how we learn to navigate those times becomes the strength and courage that we need to get us to the successes and joyful times.

After Move-Along Day: Be positive about the new placement/new school setting brought home at the end of Move-Along Day. Point out the good in the class make-up and share your belief that things will be great ~ that discussion goes a long way for alleviating anxiety and for building confidence. Every staff member will provide for a wonderful year that will offer all described above. Help your child to be open to the possibility. Don't dwell on who is not in a class or which teacher you did or did not get. You will have a great year if you set your mind to that way of thinking.

To the Fifth Graders: Congratulations! Each class takes on a special personality as it travels through the grades. In your year book, I defined your class as one that brought our motto, “Kindness matters.” alive and well from the first day you stepped into our school. You have been excellent role models, treating your underclassmen like “caring cousins”, aunts or uncles. You were so willing to help and that became your special leadership. You learned a lot and tried your best, always with benevolence ~ which means kindness, compassion, generosity and goodwill toward others. Not all groups are what you have been and I hope you continue in that way as you join with your cross-town classmates. If you know how to care for one another and solve problems, you will be successful learners. You have a keen intellect, but it is special because it combines with your kindness and makes you the problem solvers that become true leaders.

Move-Along Day: Friday, June 19th from 10:00 a.m. to 10:30 a.m.



THANK YOU to the PTO, parents, and all of the Happy Hollow staff for your help and support this year. It has been a pleasure working with all of you and with your children.

ALL medications (prescription and/or over the counter) need to be picked up by the last day of school (June 22, 2015), by a parent or designated adult.

Reminders for September:

New medication orders (prescription and/or over the counter) are required for each academic school year, and will be necessary for the start of school, September 2015. These orders need to be signed by BOTH a parent and licensed prescriber. Forms are available in the school office or can be downloaded from the Happy Hollow School web page (<http://whh.wayland.k12.ma.us/>)For Families/Health Services/Health Info & Forms. Orders can be faxed to the school at 508-358-3761 attention: Jeanne MacDonald RN.

Please submit your child's most up to date physical to the school nurse (2015). An updated physical is required on all students' entering 4th grade in September.

What's coming up in June?

Technology News for Grades 1-5 from Ms. Crozier

It's been an amazing year in technology class. Students have created some wonderful projects, worked together to solve technical problems and become skilled users of technology. **All students in grades 3-5 have made some progress in their keyboarding practice, feel free to continue to practice over the summer!** Below is a snapshot of some of our end of year projects. **Have a wonderful summer!**

1st Grade: First graders have been busy programming these last few weeks. After programming with Beebots, students expanded their programming skills using Scratch Jr. on iPads. They created an animated water scene. Lots of time to be creative and expand their programming knowledge.



2nd Grade: Second graders have been very busy finishing up their continent slideshows using Kid Pix 3D. I wonder if your child has already told you about this project. Their slideshows have been posted on my [2nd Grade Sharing Projects website](#). Their slideshow represents what they were able to accomplish in computer class over the last 7-8 weeks.



3rd Grade: Students continue to expand their Google Doc knowledge. Their LARK writing piece is finished and will be coming home. Students used Google Drawing (part of the google docs suite) to create a cover page for their technology portfolio.



4th Grade: We spent the last part of the year working on a programming unit; as well as supporting the students with their endangered species projects (research and setup of their presentation). Brick programming in Scratch is very similar to the Hour of Code activities students completed back in January. Students also used [Pro-Bots](#) to get a real hands on programming experience. Some students programmed their Pro-bot to go through a maze while others use the pen feature to program their car to draw shapes. These are both fun ways to extend their programming and engineering thinking.



5th Grade: We used several class periods to help students prepare for their Biography Celebration. We also used the time to finish up any incomplete projects.

5th Grade Tech Crew - It has been a wonderful year working with the 5th graders on the HH Tech Crew. Thank you to all of the families for your support and to the children for your commitment and dedication to this volunteer program. Have a wonderful summer!
